
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

As last month, the work done by the Committee has been largely focused on Three Barrows Down. More news on this to follow soon.



Jean Wooldridge has provided us with another news article from 100 years ago. This is from *Dover Express*, dated 20 December 1920.


SIBERTSWOLD PLACE DESTROYED BY FIRE.

On Wednesday morning, at about three o'clock, fire broke out at Sibertswold Place, Shepherdswell, the residence of Admiral Sir Ernest Rice, K.C.B., which ended in the complete destruction of this old residence, which dates from 300 years ago and said to be built from the design of Inigo Jones. It appears that in the house there were Admiral and Lady Rice and four domestic servants. At about three o'clock Lady Rice's maid heard in her room a noise under the floor, which was at first taken 'to be rats', but smoke was found to be filling the passages, and just as she raised the alarm the floor burst into flames, and the room was soon ablaze. Two of the maids at once ran to the Shepherdswell Post Office, from which the calls for assistance were sent out. The occupants of the house had very hurriedly to leave the upper floors. A good deal of assistance came from the neighbouring houses in the village, many helpers being miners, and as it was at once seen that the house was doomed every effort was made to save the furniture in the lower rooms. Meanwhile, the assistance of the Dover Fire Brigade was sought, the call being received by telephone at 3.20 a.m. As there was a long and difficult journey from Dover on the frost-bound roads, it was advised that assistance should be sought from Eastry, and this was done. The Eastry Fire Brigade at once set out, and after a very rough journey arrived at the scene at 4.15 a.m. The house was then well ablaze, lighting up the whole countryside, and the roof fell in with tremendous crash. The efforts of the villagers had been so successful that most of the furniture and pictures, including many valuable ones, had been saved from the lower floors and placed on the lawns. Only one valuable painting, which was fixed to the walls, was lost. The plate chest was also lost, defying the efforts of eight miners to shift it. There was considerable difficulty getting water. The East Kent District Water Company's mains supply the village, but, unfortunately, there are no fire hydrants, the Parish Council not having gone to the expense. The only large quantity of water obtainable was from a pond on the road near The Terrace, over 200 yards away. There was a small tank at the back of the house, and the Eastry engine, feeding from there, managed to save the kitchen and the scullery at the back of the house, which had not caught fire when they arrived. There was a very strong wind blowing, but, fortunately, it was from the east, and blew the fire away from the farm and stacks at the back of the house. An hour later the Sandwich motor fire engine arrived. This is an up-to-date and powerful engine, and took on the supply from the pond. Admiral Rice, although now of the venerable age of 80, directed and helped in the removal of the furniture and in the fire fighting. The Dover steam fire engine was sent when the call was received, but the horses had to be studded on account of the road conditions it was delayed in starting and had an extremely difficult journey up the steep and slippery hills and did not arrive until after the Sandwich brigade, and as it was not then required returned to Dover. The fire is still smouldering.



It later transpired that according to the locals the Rice family had been hoarding coal, during and after the First World War, in the cellar and this was why the house burnt so hot and fast.


Puzzles
